# Webinar 1: Overview of CIHI and the Home Care Program

## Session Description:

This introductory session provides an **overview of the Canadian Institute for Health Information (CIHI)**, its mandate, and its **work in collaborating with First Nations, Inuit and Métis peoples** to advance their health data priorities, including measuring cultural safety and Indigenous-specific racism in health systems and respecting Indigenous Data Sovereignty. Participants will learn about the **interRAI partnership, Home Care (HC) and Contact Assessment (CA) tools**, and how **data flows through the Integrated interRAI Reporting System (IRRS)**.

This session establishes the foundation for understanding how home care data is collected, protected, and used.




**Maria Klar, Clinical Specialist – Canadian Institute for Health Information (CIHI)**




- For over 30 years, CIHI has earned the trust of health systems as the main gatherer, packager and disseminator of pan-Canadian health information.


# Educational Products (Upcoming)

## FN Listening Circle to develop tools to support FN Communities to access Data

- To respectfully engage FNIM Community Health Managers, Community-based Health Researchers and CIHI-Data Users in a dialogue to:
  - Understand the needs and challenges related to accessing and understanding CIHI's data from the FNIM community-perspective
  - Identify how to reframe existing CIHI resources in a way that supports FNIM knowledge systems, self-determination and community use.
  - Lead the visioning of a reference guide to CIHI data and analytical process that is relevant, FNIM user-friendly and helps build community capacity.

# Indigenous Identifiers & OI Solution for Indigenous Organizations



**Individual identifiers**  
(e.g., Indigenous self-identifiers, client language, responsibility for payment coded as First Nations and Inuit Health Branch)



**Community identifiers**  
(e.g., geographic identifiers such as client postal codes)



**Facility identifiers**  
(e.g., long-term care homes in First Nations communities)

And potential for linkage to Indigenous registries, citizenship lists, membership list with appropriate governance/approvals



# CIHI's Policy on Release of Indigenous Data

- Prior to 2020, Indigenous-identifiable data could be released upon request, without permission from Indigenous communities, organizations, health authorities, etc.
- On August 4, 2020, CIHI implemented the Policy on the Release and Disclosure of Indigenous-Identifiable Data which states that:
  - Any request for Indigenous-identifiable data must be accompanied by approvals from appropriate Indigenous authorities.
  - The responsibility for seeking and providing evidence of approval from Indigenous authorities rests with the requestor.



# Purpose of CIHI's Policy on Release of Indigenous Data

- Ensure that release for public use and disclosure to third parties of Indigenous identifiable data respects principles of Indigenous data sovereignty.
- Provide staff with direction and support for the public use and disclosure to third parties of Indigenous identifiable data.



# Updated Indigenous Identifiable Data Policy (V1.2)

CIHI will recognize organizations as Indigenous for the purposes of reporting if their leadership requests this designation.

CIHI will add organizations on a go forward basis

The Indigenous data governance mechanisms for each designated organization are outlined in our internal supplements, along with the masking and suppression rules for availability across the organization.

As per the scope of CIHI's policy, Indigenous organizations' data will continue to be included in private reporting.

# CIHI – SLFNHA

- Collaborated for over 15 years
- Established an MoU in 2024
- Requests indicators on First Nations communities in Sioux Lookout area
- CIHI provides health information reports for communities
- Recent Cancer Report by SLFNHA was released in May 2025
- Ongoing collaboration focuses on Maternal and Newborn Health



Their network strives to promote evidence-informed clinical practice and policy decision-making.


# Benefits of the interRAI Assessments



Consistent language, definitions and coding options that inform and guide comprehensive care planning



Common, clinically relevant core elements between all interRAI assessments



Standard observation period (3 days)




# Implementation Status interRAI HC

As of Sep 4, 2025




- A — Fraser Health

- E — Vancouver Island Health






# Overview of the interRAI Contact Assessment

## The interRAI Contact Assessment:

Records basic clinical information for persons with less complex needs who may not receive a comprehensive assessment

Provides 8 clinical outputs for informed decision making regarding appropriate support and services

Has been designed to be compatible with the interRAI HC



# interRAI CA Outputs

- The interRAI-CA has embedded decision support outputs
- These outputs summarize information from the completed assessment
- Can support both clinical and organizational decision making



# interRAI CA and the interRAI HC work together

Both assessments cover key domains of:

- Physical function
- Cognition and mental health
- Social support
- Treatments and service use

CA only records essential information needed at time of intake or screening to support decisions regarding:

- Further assessment
- Home care services
- Specialized services (e.g. rehab)





## Where does the data go?

The Integrated interRAI Reporting System (IRRS) manages information captured with interRAI's integrated suite of assessments

It houses comprehensive health information (demographic, administrative and clinical) from different care settings in a single reporting system
