## Learning Outcomes:

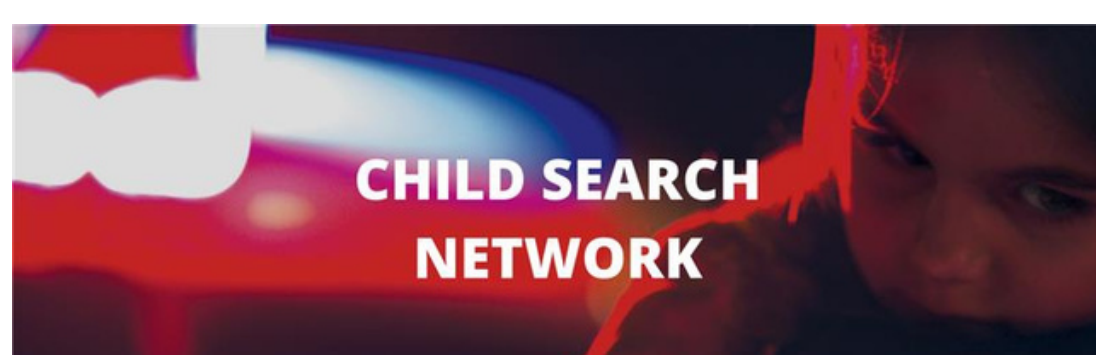
- Gain insight into the Child Search Network and how it enhances public awareness, community involvement, and cross-sector collaboration in locating missing children

**Amanda Pick**, CEO of the Missing Children Society of Canada (MCSC), has over a decade of experience leading national efforts to support missing children through innovative technology, community engagement, and trauma-informed practices. As CEO, she has worked closely with members of Tsuut'ina Nation to support culturally sensitive approaches in developing the Child Search Network.

**Patricia Hung** - Retired police officer, registered psychotherapist, and President of Missing Persons and Police Partnerships. Patricia brings a unique perspective shaped by both professional expertise and personal tragedy.

**Brittany Ouelette** - Born and raised in Calgary, Alberta, with family roots in Kinonjeoshtegon First Nation, Treaty 7, and Métis Heritage. She shares her life with her partner Jamie, and their 3 children. A proud Indigenous woman, Brittany is committed to reshaping perspectives within the justice system. She began her career with the Tsuut'ina Police Service in 2015, and now serves as an Executive Director of the Community Impact and Innovation Section. She holds a Bachelor's in Criminal Justice with minors in Women's and Indigenous Studies, and is completing her Master's in Community Development at the University of Victoria.

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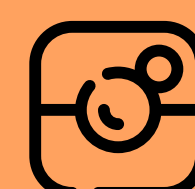
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
