- Know what to watch for and how to make/encourage a referral

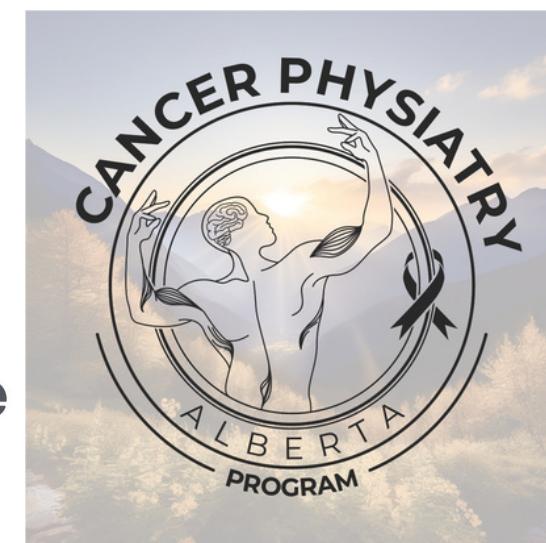
Speakers:
